WEXFORD DAY 1 DAY 1

STOP 1

Irish National M **Heritage Park**

Start your time in Wexford by visiting the past. The Irish National Heritage Park will take you on a gentle woodland walk, surrounded by wildlife.

Dotted throughout the trees you'll see beautifully reconstructed buildings that take you from the first people to arrive on the island around 9000 years ago, up to the Celts, the Vikings and even a small monastery.

Book ahead and do the Viking Life Experience to try on clothes, make some Viking pennies and learn what life was like in Weissfjord 1000 years ago.

STOP 2

The Wilds Café

Just 20 minutes away, you'll find The Wilds an award-winning café and lifestyle shop.

Here, you'll find welcoming staff, stunning décor and a gorgeous menu that proudly showcases local food producers and farmers. traditional dishes with a modern twist and something to suit all tastes. Vegan & coeliac options available.

Be sure to browse the store after a tasty meal to take home some beautiful homewares or locally produced food and drink.

STOP 3

Enniscorthy Castle

Leave the car at The Wilds Café and take the short walk down the hill to visit Enniscorthy Castle. This castle has more than a few claims to fame, the first being the birthplace of the term 'wallop'.

Your self-guided tour takes you all the way to the roof, currently the only castle in Ireland that offer access to the rooftop. Enjoy exhibits of Eileen Gray's acclaimed works and set pieces and props from the Oscar-nominated movie 'Brooklyn' which was partly filmed in the town along the way.

Staying with medieval Ireland, we'll head back to the car for the short drive to Ferns Heritage Village - once the great capital of Leinster and home to ancient Celtic Royalty.

Book into the Medieval Experience before your visit and take the guiz to find out if you have what it takes to be a Celtic King and learn some of the quirkier medieval history!

Afterwards, you can visit Europe's smallest cathedral, take in the fantastic street art and climb to the top of Ferns Castle for some incredibly scenic views.

From hidden alleyways to American presidents and award-winning street art, there is so much to discover.

The town of New Ross will come to life as you hear the stories of the town's incredible and extensive history. Keep an eye out for the fact plagues along the way!

STOP 2

Dunbrody **Famine Ship**

No visit to New Ross is complete without climbing aboard this restored 18th-century passenger ship.

Called 'coffin ships' by the Irish peasantry, this interactive museum tells the story of the hundreds of people who emigrated during the the Great Famine with the hope of better lives abroad in the US and Canada.

Take a tour below the decks and hear the insightful stories of the journeys taken aboard this very ship from the costumed tour guides.

STOP 3

The Cracked **Teapot**

A truly great spot for lunch is The Cracked Teapot, tucked away in one of the historical side streets of New Ross.

This warm and inviting tearoom is a popular spot with locals and with their reputation, it's no surprise. Chef Tina specialises in delicious vegan and vegetarian dishes and proudly features local producers on the menu.

Top tip, don't skip dessert! The fresh bakes are not to be missed.

Full & Plenty Farm Shop

After collecting the car, make a quick pit stop at the Full & Plenty Farm Shop and grab a cup of Moyee Coffee and some snacks for the road.

This award-winning farm shop is a great place to pick up a few souvenirs and if you're selfcatering, you can pick up plenty of delicious locally produced groceries, from farmhouse milk to freshly baked sourdough bread.

The shelves are packed with fresh organic produce and delicious food and drink products from Wexford producers.

The Kennedy Homestead

Discover more about the story of John F. Kennedy's family with a visit to his ancestral home at the Kennedy Homestead.

This tiny farmhouse has grown into a modern farm, but is still home to the same family. They have maintained the original house, including the adapted car seat that US President JFK used when he came for tea!

This experience provides a fascinating insight into America's first family and their undying connection to Ireland.

STOP 6

Slieve Coillte

Take a short detour to the summit of Slieve Coillte where you can drive to the very top, so it is accessible to everyone. From the summit, the views are absolutely breathtaking and on a clear day, you can see all the way to up to the Dublin Mountains and across to Tipperary.


You'll also have magnificent coastal views of Hook Lighthouse and the Saltee Islands in the distance. Just below you is the longest bridge in Ireland - the Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy Bridge - which crosses the Waterford Estuary of the River Barrow.

On the slopes of Slieve Coillte is the JFK Memorial Park & Arboretum - a beautiful parkland offering stunning views of the coastline as far as Waterford.

A tree from every country in the world is planted here, so this is not a normal woodland walk! Words cannot describe the peaceful atmosphere, coupled with the breathtaking beauty of the place in high season when the flowering rhododendrons are in full bloom.

Campile is home to the best 99 in Ireland as voted by listeners of Today FM. Drop into Hayes Daybreak and try one for yourself. They even have a sundae named "The Bomb."

Did you know?



This entire area was once forested, stretching all the way to the Wicklow Mountains. Legend has it that the mythical warrior Fionn Mac Cumhaill used to hunt for deer here after being awarded lands in North Wexford by the Celtic High King Cormac Mac Airt.

This morning takes you to the fishing village of Ballyhack to meet skippers Bob and Walter.

You will be touring the Hook Peninsula by water as you sail out to sea passing by Duncannon Fort, Loftus Hall and the iconic Hook Lighthouse along the way.

You'll hear plenty of stories, including the tale of Dollar Bay and the pirate treasure still believed to be buried under the golden sands of the bay.

Our next stop embraces everything dry land has to offer. The gardens at Kilmokea Country Manor create a wonderfully relaxing walk for adults and the surprises hidden amongst the trees make it great fun for younger visitors.

The gardens are packed full of unusual plants like towering banana trees. The wild garden contains everything from dragons to a Wild West outpost, and the kitchen gardens grow lots of delicious fresh vegetables for use in their Conservatory Café.

The Pink Teacup Café

Light lunches are served here from 12 noon to 3pm. The organic delights have become a favourite of many regular garden visitors.

Enjoy homemade soups of mushroom & parsley, courgette & brie, carrot & mint or Mediterranean roast tomato served with Kilmokea home-baked brown bread filled with cranberries, herbs, sundried tomatoes or cheese. Wash the tasty delicacies down with a pot of tea and enjoy the views of the gardens from the conservatory.


Heading down the Hook Peninsula towards Hook Lighthouse, there are plenty of interesting detours you can take like Slade Castle and Dollar Bay.

You'll spot Loftus Hall looming along the Hook Peninsula - Ireland's most haunted house. Your stop sits right at the end of the peninsula - Hook Lighthouse.

A World Heritage Site and one of the region's most popular attractions, this place will blow your mind - even if it's not windy that day! Your tour takes you from the medieval coal stores at the tower's base all the way to the viewing platform on the top.

The first custodians of Hook lighthouse were a group of monks that lived in a nearby. These monks, who are thought to have aided in its construction, warned sailors about the dangers of the Hook peninsula by lighting beacons of fire.

Take a stop at The Vine Cottage and Bar and enjoy a drink overlooking the waters.

Did you know?



The area is called Saltmills because of the Iron Age Salt Mills that once stood here. When you see how far the water recedes at low tide, it makes perfect sense!

Fun Fact



Courtown became a holiday destination when a railway line from Dublin to Gorey was added in 1863, which made it one of the oldest resort destinations in Ireland.

Leaving the history behind us, today we move to the north of the county to Courtown to visit Seal Rescue Ireland.

The only centre of its kind in the Ireland, it is a hub of marine biology with students coming from every corner of the world to work here and contribute to their conservation efforts..

When you visit, you can spend a morning learning all about the seals, how they end up here, how they are rehabilitated and best of all. feeding time. Get the opportunity to feed the seals in their care, just be sure the crafty heron doesn't steal too many!

Head down 'Boutique Boulevard' to visit some of the many award-winning clothing boutiques and art galleries, and stop for a drink in French's Pub afterwards. Opened in 1775, it is the oldest Pub in Wexford and has changed very little in all that time.

Before dinner, get to know Wexford town a little more by taking an evening walking tour. You may be surprised by the hidden history of this Viking town with links to the US Navy, the Archbishop of Canterbury and even Zorro!

Afterwards, choose from many of the fantastic restaurants that the wonderful town of Wexford has to offer. Perhaps enjoy dinner at La Côte, an award-winning restaurant right on the quay which serves seafood dishes with the freshest catches from nearby Kilmore Quay.

A stunning castle and sitting on acres of beautiful garden grounds, you can easily spend a day exploring this place. Start off with the agricultural museum and after a stop for lunch in the café, take a tour of the castle itself.

Afterwards, take some time to explore the gardens. The meandering walk takes you by the ruins of the original castle that was built here 800 years ago. Make sure you pick up some peacock feed at the visitor centre to feed the amazing peacocks patrolling the grounds.

Today's travels take us back out onto the water. Head down to the fishing village of Kilmore Quay and you'll meet Declan Bates who will take you on a tour of the area known as the graveyard of a thousand ships! But don't worry, you're in safe hands. The name comes from the pirate and buccaneers that haunted this coastline for hundreds of years.

Sail out to the Saltee Islands and along the way, you'll hear the wonderful tale of the uninhabited island's own monarch. The island is home to an array of wildlife, including puffins who inhabit the islands from April to mid-August each year.

Back on solid ground, you're bound to be hungry from your day of exploring islands. Make a stop at The Little Saltee Restaurant and Takeaway.

Renowned along the east coast of Ireland, it is considered to be one of the top chippers in the country and with fish this fresh and tasty, it is no wonder!

Be sure to try a rissole, a Wexford delicacy. They consist of a scrumptious blend of potatoes, breadcrumbs and herbs which is then fried.

Tacumshane Windmill

Just 20 minutes away is Meyler's Millhouse and this cute little pub has something rather special; a fully functioning windmill.

Built in the mid-1800s, this perfectly miniature windmill was once one of many that dotted the coasts and hills of Wexford but sadly, this is the only one remaining. Just ask at the bar for the key and explore the workings inside. Be sure to check out the revolving roof!

Even today, it retains a sense of peacefulness rarely found in our busy world. After your stroll, grab an ice-cream in the local shop to unwind and watch the sun set over the lake.

Your final day takes you away from the coast and into the rich agricultural fields of Wexford and your first stop is at Regan Organic Farm.

Supplying poultry and eggs to many of Ireland's top hotels and cookery schools, your tour takes you out across the fields to see what free range really means. Pigs, hens, turkeys and alpacas all roam freely in large enclosures with some of the best views of the mountains in the area.

You cannot explore Wexford's food without sampling the county's famous strawberries. And where better to do so than at one of the oldest berry farms in the county!

Wheelocks is a convenient place for lunch too. You'll find the food is farmhouse faire with an emphasis on local produce.

Afterwards, spend a while picking strawberries to take home and learn a little about the different strains of berries. Check out the farm animals on the short woodland walk with a coffee in hand before heading to the next stop.

Farmer Liam switched from sheep and never looked back, with buffalo meat proving to be leaner, healthier and extremely popular. On a tour of the farm, you'll learn all about its benefits while also getting up close with some of these gentle giants.
